




MATH

Engaging in mathematical activities can also encourage students to explore number combinations, place value, patterns, and other important mathematical concepts. 

































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
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
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
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







































































































































SCIENCE





















































































SOCIAL STUDIES






SPECIAL ASSEMBLIES


Our existence is all about celebrations. It is important to keep the spark of life alive and live freely.




9 OCTOBER


The students depicted the beauty of the mountains through paintings and models. Students of Grade IV focused on the Aravali Range and made beautiful posters with appeals to save the range.
























CBSE ACTIVITIES




VIGILANCE AWARENESS WEEK (VAW) 2021












































SPORTS WEEK




It was my 3rd birthday when my mother gifted me my first set of LEGO blocks.

BIRTH OF CRICKET

The earliest reference to cricket is in South East England in the mid-16th century. It spread globally with the expansion of the British Empire, with the first international matches in the second half of the 19th century. The game's governing body is the International Cricket Council (ICC), which has over 100 members, twelve of which are full members who play Test matches. The game's rules, the Laws of Cricket, are maintained by Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC) in London. The sport is followed primarily in South Asia, Australasia, the United Kingdom, southern Africa and the West Indies.

FORMS OF CRICKET

Forms of cricket range from Twenty20, with each team batting for a single innings of 20 overs and the game generally lasting three hours, to Test matches played over five days. Traditionally cricketers play in all-white kit, but in limited overs cricket they wear club or team colours. In addition to the basic kit, some players wear protective gear to prevent injury caused by the ball, which is a hard, solid spheroid made of compressed leather with a slightly raised sewn seam enclosing a cork core layered with tightly wound string.

WORLD RECORDS OF CRICKET

- 1. Sachin Tendulkar from India who is known as "The God of the Cricket" hold the record of being the No.1 cricketer of all the time.
- 2. M.S. Dhoni from India hold the record of being the No.1and successful captain in the world.
- 3. Rohit Sharma from India hold the record of being the batsman who hit the highest score in the ODI.
- 4. Virat Kohli from India hold the record of being the batsman who has the highest run in IPL.
- 5. Chris Gayle from West Indies hold the record of being the No.1 batsman in IPL.
- 6. AB De Villiers from South Africa hold the record to smashed the fastest 50, 100 and 150 in ODI.
- 7. India is the only team who hold the record of win the 3 ICC trophies under the leadership of one captain, M.S. DHONI.
- 8. Australia is the team who won 5 world cup trophies.
- 9. Trent Boult from New Zealand hold the record of being the No. 1 bowler in the world.
- 10. Yuvraj Singh from India hold the record of being the first player who hit 6 sixes in an over.

ABOUT IPL

The Indian Premier League (IPL) is a professional men's Twenty20 cricket league, contested by ten teams based out of ten Indian cities. The league was founded by the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) in 2007. It is usually held between March and May of every year and has an exclusive window in the ICC Future Tours Programme.

The IPL is the most-attended cricket league in the world and in 2014 was ranked sixth by average attendance among all sports leagues. In 2010, the IPL became the first sporting event in the world to be broadcast live on YouTube. The brand value of the IPL in 2019 was ₹47,500 crore (US\$6.3 billion), according to Duff & Phelps. According to BCCI, the 2015 IPL season contributed ₹1,150 crore (US\$150 million) to the GDP of the Indian economy. The 2020 IPL season set a massive viewership record with 31.57 million average impressions and with an overall consumption increase of 23 per cent from the 2019 season.

There have been fourteen seasons of the IPL tournament. The current IPL title holders are the Chennai Super Kings, winning the 2021 season. The venue for the 2020 season was moved due to the COVID-19 pandemic and games were played in the United Arab Emirates.




MORAL VALUES

What are moral values?



How civilization affected wildlife

Fauna refers to the animals that live and grow in areas uninhabited by humans. It includes all non-domesticated animals. Animals are found in all ecosystems such as forests, plains, grasslands, deserts and all other areas. But as the human civilizations developed, the domestication of wild animals began for the benefit of human beings and this had a considerable impact on the environment. Due to human activities, many wild animals adapted to the changes in the environment and started to live in a domestic environment along with humans. As the human activities increased and development took place on a large scale, the wildlife and the ecosystems were seen to be greatly affected by it. It was noticed that the exploitation of the wild animals for the benefit of human beings and recreation purposes increased.

Humans impacted the physical environment in many ways: overpopulation, pollution, burning fossil fuels, and deforestation triggered climate change, soil erosion, poor air quality, and undrinkable water.

Wildlife in India

India is rich in its fauna. It has approximately 90,000 animal species and 2,000 species of birds. They constitute 13% of the total world's stock. There are 2546 species of fish, which account for nearly 12% of the world's stock. We also have 5 to 8% of the world's amphibians, reptiles and mammals. The existence of animals in our country varies from place to place. The many animals in India include- elephants, rhinoceroses, lion, tigers, yak, Tibetan antelope, mountain fox, jungle frogs, wild cattle etc. India is the only place where both Lions and Tigers can be found. Lions are found in Gujrat and Tigers are found in Madhya Pradesh. A variety of birds that include colorful, peacocks, pheasants, ducks, parakeets, cranes and pigeons. Many Animals have suffered because of the industrial growth of India. These include-the Red Panda, the Bengal Tiger, the Ganges River Dolphin and the Asian Elephant which are endangered and the Snow Leopard and the Greater One Horned Rhinoceros which are considered vulnerable. Many animals have also gone extinct, these include-Chittagong Rhinoceros, Pink Headed Duck, Asiatic Cheetah, India Aurochs.

Steps Taken to preserve the Fauna in India

The following are the efforts made by the Indian Government for wildlife conservation:

- Project Tiger
- Project Elephant
- Sea turtle project
- Crocodile conservation project
- Project Dolphin
- Captive Breeding program

Project Tiger

- It is a centrally sponsored scheme launched in 1973 for the conservation of Indian Tiger which is endangered. The Tiger population has been reduced from many last decades.
- For this, the National Tiger Conservation Authority is constituted. The program started with 9 Tiger reserve, and presently it is approximately 20. Tiger census has occurred in every four years.

Project Elephant

- It is also a centrally sponsored scheme and launched in 1992. It is implemented in 13 states. Under this, 88 Elephants corridors were set up.
- Haathi Mere Saathi scheme was also launched by the Ministry of Environment,
 Forest and Climate Change in partnership with wildlife trust of India.

Sea Turtle Project

- It was launched by Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change in collaboration with UNDP in 1999. The Olive Ridley Turtle visits India during Winter.
- The implementing agency of this project is the Wildlife Institute of India. It is in the Vulnerable in IUCN list.

Crocodile conservation project

- Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change has notified Ganges River Dolphin as National Aquatic animal.
- This was project was introduced to counter the major threats to ocean life including river water pollution, poaching and siltation.

Captive Breeding Program

• Captive breeding can be described as the selection of wild species and bred in the artificial condition under experts. It may represent the last chance to preserve a species in the wild.

Steps for implementation of preservation of Fauna

Certain steps must be taken by the government for the implementation of these schemes. These steps include :-

- 1. To survey and collect all the information about wildlife, especially, their number and growth.
- 2. To protect the habitat by protecting forests.
- 3. To delimit the areas of their natural habitat.
- 4. To protect wildlife from pollution and from natural hazards and climate change.

Conclusion

Wildlife conservation is necessary for sustainable development. Various efforts have been made at the national and international level for the preservation of fauna. This shows how fauna plays an important role for the existence of humanity and also for the preservation and sustenance of biodiversity and the ecological balance.
