Greetings from Imperial Heritage School!

August brings with it the vibrant spirit of Independence and the rhythm of learning in full swing. As we honor our nation's journey on Independence Day, let us also strive for personal growth and excellence. With the monsoon showers refreshing the earth, may our minds too be refreshed with curiosity, discipline, and determination. "Let us learn not just to grow, but to contribute — for knowledge is the true mark of freedom."

In the month of July school activities began, submission of holiday homework mostly as project work and we are delighted to see the wonderful works students have carried with a lot of interest. On **5th July**, a **Parent Orientation Programme** was conducted to share updates on revised board exam guidelines and key school protocols. The session helped strengthen the school–parent partnership for the year ahead.

In an effort to sensitize the students and drive home the significance of books in our lives. Book Week was organised in school. D.E.A.R. stands for **“Drop Everything and Read,”** a national celebration of reading designed to remind every individual to make reading a prime important activity in their lives. This activity was conducted to remind the students to enjoy the simple pleasures of reading and to take a break from their usual routines.

Our school recently organized an educational activity on 10th July 2025, which focused on **Project Dolphin**, a government initiative dedicated to the conservation and protection of dolphins in India's rivers and coastal areas. The activity aimed to spread awareness among students about the importance of dolphins and how we can contribute to their protection. As part of the activity, students created colorful posters and slogans about dolphin conservation. These were displayed in the school corridor to encourage more students and visitors to learn about Project Dolphin. We watched videos showing the dolphins' habitat, their behavior, and the threats they face, such as pollution and habitat loss. The “Protect Dolphins” pledge was taken in the assembly, where they pledged to save dolphins.

The aim of CBSE activity **“Samvidhan Hatya Diwas”** was to sensitize students about the importance of the Indian Constitution, its democratic principles, and to critically reflect on any perceived threats or violations to constitutional values in the past or present. The activity encouraged awareness, critical thinking, and civic responsibility among students. Teachers guided students to understand how the Constitution ensures justice, liberty, equality, and fraternity for all citizens. “Samvidhan Hatya Diwas” served as a powerful reminder to protect and uphold the values enshrined in the Indian Constitution.

“**Sadak Suraksha**” activity was carried out wherein students were shown a video shared by CBSE on 14 July, 2025.

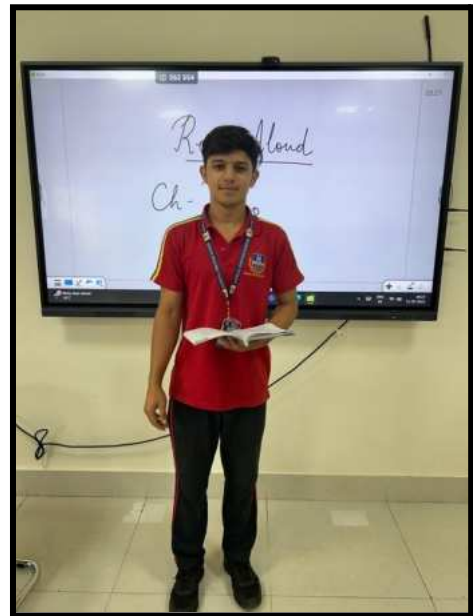
In alignment with CBSE’s “**Tobacco Free Youth campaign 2.0,**” students took part in pledging to a healthy, tobacco-free lifestyle. CBSE activity “**Ek ped maa k naam**” where students created a QR code for the plant and shared a geotagged picture where their plant is growing.

As part of the Grade XII **English** curriculum, a **Read Aloud Activity** was conducted with reference to the chapter ‘*Indigo*’ on 11th July, 2025. The primary objective of this activity was to help students engage deeply with the text while enhancing their reading fluency, voice modulation, and interpretative understanding. In addition, the read-aloud format promoted active listening, peer learning, and critical discussion. It provided a platform for students to express perspectives, understand tone and context, and connect the events of the text with contemporary social justice issues.

In **Political Science**, students studied about the *Era of One-Party Dominance* and explored the significant phase in the democratic systems where a single political party consistently remained in power over an extended period, due to widespread public support, historical legacy, or lack of strong opposition.

Values are an integral part of the curriculum at Imperial Heritage School, and a quote by John Dewey, “Education is not preparation for life, education is life itself,” resonates the same. The value of the month was **Kindness**, and students were engaged and shown videos on the same.
