INDIA -SOUTH KOREA CULTURAL EXCHANGE-IHSians proudly participated in their **first Student Cultural Exchange Programme** with their long-associated partner school in **South Korea**. The visit by a team of 10 delegation was a truly enriching experience, offering students a wonderful opportunity to immerse themselves in a new culture through school visits, meaningful interactions, and lasting friendships. They enjoyed authentic Korean food, vibrant music and dance performances, and engaging cultural activities that made learning both exciting and memorable. This unforgettable journey fostered global understanding, mutual respect, and cherished memories that will remain with the students for years to come.

On the academic front, students continued to strengthen their conceptual understanding, critical thinking, and application of knowledge across all subject areas. A balanced blend of collaborative activities, hands-on experiences, project-based learning, and regular assessments ensured steady academic progress while nurturing confidence and a genuine love for learning.

In **English** , to introduce the concept of **Doing Words (verbs)**, the students enjoyed a playful “**Simon Says**” activity in the school playground. Learning turned into movement as children eagerly followed commands—*jump, run, clap*—but only when “Simon said,” helping them physically experience verbs through fun and play. The session concluded with a creative **Action Tree**, where students illustrated different verbs and proudly showcased their understanding through beautifully crafted notebook presentations. In addition, children explored the **One and Many** concept through an exciting **Object Hunt**, reinforcing number sense while connecting grammar and Math in a joyful, hands-on way.

In **Math** , the concept of Addition was introduced through interactive tools like number lines and abacus beads, making learning both visual and hands-on. A number line—with its evenly spaced intervals—helped students understand the sequence of numbers and grasp how addition moves us forward along the line. Using this tool, children identified and located numbers before solving additional sums with confident jumps. The abacus, with its tactile charm, offered another layer of engagement, allowing young learners to count, group, and add with clarity. These activities turned abstract numbers into tangible steps, sparking curiosity and reinforcing foundational skills with every move.

In **EVS** the students enthusiastically delved into the theme “*Our Culture*” through a series of lively, hands-on experiences. They visited nearby places of worship such as temples and gurudwaras, observing

traditions and learning about the values they represent. Children also discovered the significance of holy books, deepening their understanding of faith and respect. To bring the theme alive, students participated in **Show & Tell sessions**, and brought different state foods and shared cultural objects and stories with pride. They further showcased diversity through **role plays**, highlighting different communities, their customs, and traditional foods. These activities not only nurtured curiosity and respect for varied cultures but also encouraged communication skills, confidence, and a spirit of harmony among the young learners.

To gently nurture the spirit of **kindness**, the **value for the month**, our young learners created a vibrant *Wall of Kindness*. Each child proudly placed their personal kindness card on it, expressing gratitude and care. They also crafted heartfelt cards for the helping staff, bringing smiles and appreciation to those who support them every day. 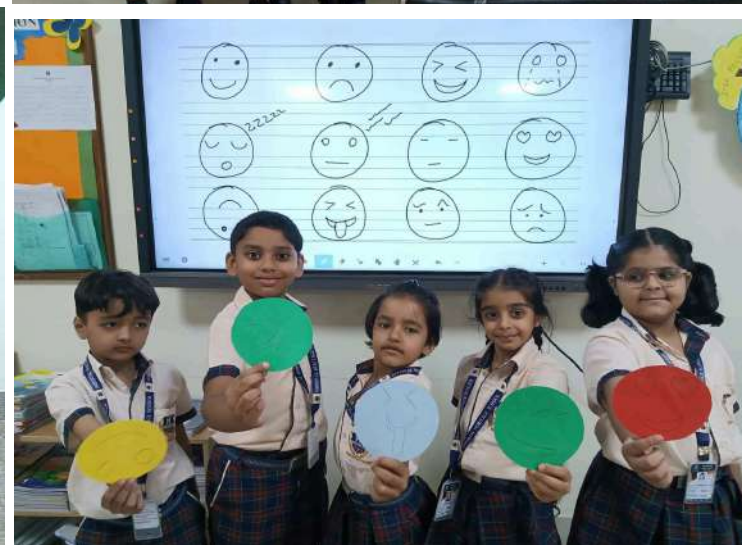

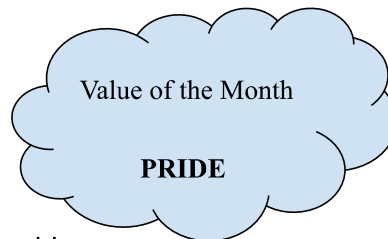

3. General Information
