**Season’s Greetings from Grade VI!**

In the changing weather conditions of the unpredictable February, the best thing is to hold on to strength, courage and preparedness for the coming days. The transition from one class to another is a great moment for the students and the current month will gear them up well with academic prowess. As the session comes to a close, it is time to look back at the year gone by with fond memories. The PTM was successfully conducted and parents were apprised of their ward’s academic progress through the unit test III results. The students were also given the term end exams datesheet, signalling the onset of assessment and graduation to the next class. They are gearing up for various verbal assessments in languages. *The activities conducted are as follows:*

- **National Youth Day** : National Youth Day commemorates the birth anniversary of Swami Vivekananda and celebrates his ideals of courage, conscience, and compassion. The students designed and decorated a bookmark featuring an inspiring quote by Swami Vivekananda. The activity aims to encourage reading habits, foster creativity, and help students reflect upon and internalize his inspirational ideas.
- **Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose Jayanti**: To commemorate Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose Jayanti, students participated in composing original slogans portraying Netaji as an enduring inspiration for today’s youth, linking his ideals of leadership, bravery, discipline, and patriotism with contemporary India. The activity enhanced historical understanding, critical thinking, creativity, and value-based learning while fostering respect for India’s freedom struggle and inspiring responsible citizenship.
- **National Girl Child Day** : To create awareness about the importance, rights, and empowerment of the girl child, an activity was designed to encourage respect, equality, and appreciation for women and girls. Students researched and wrote about government schemes launched to promote and protect the girl child (e.g., Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, Sukanya Samridhhi Yojana, etc.)
- **Universal Post Union 2026 International Letter Writing Competition** : Students were encouraged to participate in a letter writing competition wherein they had to compose a heartfelt and original letter to a friend explaining why human connection matters in a digital world. Students of VI have given an impressive number of letters. The follow up round will be conducted in March 2026.
- **National Girl Child Day** was observed in the school to create awareness about the importance of the girl child and promote gender equality among students. The students of grade XI Humanities wrote a life sketch of female bureaucrats of India, inspiring them through examples of leadership, determination, and service.
- **Republic Day**- India celebrates **Republic Day on 26 January** to commemorate the adoption and enforcement of the Indian Constitution in **1950**, marking the nation’s transformation into a **sovereign, socialist, secular, and democratic republic** governed by its own laws, replacing the British-era Government of India Act. The day upholds the constitutional values of **justice, liberty, equality, and fraternity**, empowering citizens to choose their own government. Unlike **Independence Day (15 August)**, which marks freedom from British rule, Republic Day celebrates the establishment of India’s constitutional democracy. To mark this occasion, **Grade 1 students presented a special assembly** that beautifully instilled feelings of **patriotism and national pride** through melodious songs, a meaningful

skit, and vibrant dance performances. The assembly began with the **Principal's flag hoisting**, followed by the **National Anthem**, setting a solemn and inspiring tone for the celebration.

- **IHS** students also celebrated **Basant Panchami** with great joy and enthusiasm through a special assembly. The assembly highlighted the importance of Basant Panchami as a festival that marks the arrival of spring and honours Goddess Saraswati, the goddess of knowledge and wisdom. The children came dressed in yellow, symbolising energy, happiness, and learning. They sang a melodious song, and performed a dance about the festival with confidence. The assembly concluded with a message encouraging students to love learning and respect knowledge. The celebration was colourful, meaningful, and enjoyed by everyone present.
- Under CBSE activity a **Road Safety Mass Pledge** was conducted in the school premises to create awareness about safe road practices among students and staff. During the pledge, everyone committed to following traffic rules, wearing safety gear, avoiding distractions while walking or driving, and respecting pedestrians. The programme aimed to instill a sense of responsibility and discipline on the roads, helping students understand their role in preventing accidents and ensuring safety for all.



