**NIE Movie -** Students watched the NIE movie *Mahaavtaar Narsimha*, which beautifully depicted the triumph of good over evil. The inspiring narrative highlighted devotion, courage, and righteousness, leaving the young audience with valuable moral lessons and a deeper understanding of India's rich mythological heritage.

**Hiroshima Day:** On Hiroshima Day, students created a symbolic **Peace Tree** adorned with leaves carrying heartfelt messages of harmony, non-violence, and compassion. Each message reflected their hope for a world free of war and hatred. The activity instilled values of peace-building and global responsibility among the young learners.

Inter School Competition: At Gurugram Global Heights, our students- Sanskriti Srivastava, Ada Behl, Aadya Vishnoi, Navi Tripathi, and Anushka Chaudhury- participated in an inter-school competition where they powerfully depicted Emperor Ashoka's transformation and his timeless message of peace. **World Sanskrit Day**: Our students created posters in Sanskrit on the theme "*Plastic is Harmful*". Through drawings, slogans, and verses, they highlighted plastic's dangers to Earth, rivers, animals, and the environment, while practicing Sanskrit and spreading the vital message of **environmental conservation** on World Sanskrit Diwas.

**Janamashtmi Special Assembly VIII A:** Grade VIII-A hosted a special Janmashtami assembly, bringing alive the divine charm, playfulness, and mystique of Lord Krishna through heartfelt prayers, graceful dance, and an engaging skit. The most touching moment was the portrayal of the deep friendship between Lord Krishna and Sudama, beautifully capturing their humility, love, and mutual respect.

**Heritage Week:** As part of Heritage Week, students created engaging and artistic language posters, reflecting India's linguistic diversity. **WWGC Classroom Challenge:** WWF-India has launched 'Wild Wisdom Global Challenge 2025', and its theme is Incredible Insects. As the first round, a classroom challenge, featuring an objective-type pen-and-paper assessment, was held on Monday, August 11th, for Grades VI-IX. The top 2 student performers will represent the school in the city-level round.

**Subject Enrichment Activities:** In **Science**, students learnt about electrostatic force and that static friction is more than the sliding friction with the help of a spring balance. 
