September marks the beginning of pleasant weather, as the hot days slowly turn cooler and the breeze becomes refreshing. The skies often turn clearer after the monsoon showers, filling the air with freshness. With the change in season, nature looks more vibrant—trees seem greener and flowers begin to bloom again. The month brings with it joy and festivity, with Durga Puja celebrated with great devotion and enthusiasm. People decorate their homes and pandals, sing and dance in celebration, and seek the blessings of Goddess Durga. The season of togetherness, happiness, and cultural richness makes September truly special.

The month of August was full of joy, colours, and celebrations. Children participated in various creative activities and festivals that made learning fun and exciting. It was a month of patriotism, culture, and hands-on experiences that brought smiles and valuable learning to all.

The month of August began with a vibrant **Theme Assembly**. A Theme Assembly was conducted where children showcased their learning with confidence and creativity. Through songs, skits, and presentations, they expressed the knowledge and values they had gained in class. The purpose of the Theme Assembly was to provide students with a platform to present their understanding in an interactive way, while also building their confidence, communication, and collaborative skills. Such assemblies make learning meaningful and joyful, as children connect classroom knowledge with real-life situations. It not only highlighted their talents but also encouraged teamwork, responsibility, and the joy of learning. Parents and teachers alike witnessed the enthusiasm of students, making the assembly a truly memorable and enriching experience. Along with the presentations, the holiday homework of all the students was displayed in the corridor. This showcase highlighted their creativity and effort. It provided an opportunity for everyone to appreciate the hard work and talent of the children.

In **Literacy**, children learned the letters **Ii, Jj, Kk, and Ll** along with their corresponding sounds through a variety of engaging activities. The introduction of each letter was done with phonics, where children practiced the sound repeatedly to develop clear recognition. They traced the letters using sand, clay, and flashcards, which strengthened their fine motor skills and improved letter formation. Fun games such as identifying objects that

began with the sounds /i/, /j/, /k/, and /l/ made the learning interactive and meaningful. Alongside, children enjoyed craft-based activities like making igloos for “Ii,” decorating kites for “Kk,” and drawing lions for “Ll.” Storytelling, rhymes, and songs were also included to help them associate sounds with familiar words. Through these multi-sensory approaches, children not only recognized and pronounced the letters confidently but also began to apply their learning in everyday conversations and classroom tasks.

In **Numeracy**, children learned the numbers **17, 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22** under the concept of **Tens and Ones**. They practiced counting using concrete objects such as beads, sticks, and blocks to understand how numbers are formed. By grouping ten objects together and adding extra ones, they were able to clearly see the difference between the “tens” place and the “ones” place. Activities like bundling ice-cream sticks into groups of ten and then adding loose sticks for ones made the concept more meaningful. Children also engaged in number games, sequencing, and writing practice to strengthen their recognition and understanding of these numbers.

Along with number work, children explored the **pre-math concept of Heavy and Light**. Through hands-on activities such as comparing classroom objects, they understood the difference in weight. They enjoyed sorting objects into groups of “heavy” and “light,” which helped them develop observation, reasoning, and comparison skills in a fun way.

In the area of **Shapes**, the focus of the month was on the **Square**. Children learned to identify a square by its properties – four equal sides and four corners. They traced and coloured square shapes, identified square objects in their surroundings (such as windows, dice, and tiles), and even created square art using paper folding and craft activities. These engaging exercises helped them not only to recognize the square shape but also apply this knowledge to real-life contexts.

Through these activities, children developed a stronger foundation in numeracy, logical thinking, and shape recognition while enjoying hands-on, experiential learning.

In **EVS**, children were introduced to the theme “**Food.**” They learned about the importance of food in our daily lives and explored its different types in an interactive and engaging way. The concept of **types of food** was explained through discussions, picture cards, and real-life examples. Children understood that some foods give us energy, some help us grow, and some keep us healthy and strong.

They also explored where **we get food**, identifying sources such as plants and animals. Activities like sorting pictures of fruits, vegetables, milk, eggs, and grains helped them recognize plant-based and animal-based foods. Through storytelling and role-play, they enjoyed understanding how farmers grow crops and how food reaches us.

Children further learned **what we get from food** — such as energy to play and study, strength to grow, and good health. They also discussed healthy and unhealthy food choices, which encouraged them to build good eating habits. To make the theme more meaningful, activities like drawing their favourite food, making a healthy food collage, and simple discussions during snack time were included.

Overall, the theme of Food helped children realize the value of eating healthy, the sources of what they eat, and how food plays an important role in keeping us active, strong, and happy.

The month of **August** turned out to be a vibrant journey of creativity, cultural celebration, and hands-on learning for the children. It started on the 1st day

of August with the **Friendship Band Craft**, where children used colourful threads, beads, and ribbons to design their own bands. This activity was not only an exercise in creativity and fine motor skills but also a way of understanding the true meaning of friendship, love, and togetherness. The joy of exchanging these handmade tokens made the day special and memorable for all.

Children took part in the **Colour Burst – Tri Colour Chandrayaan Craft**, which beautifully blended art with national pride. While working with the three colours of our flag, they learned about Chandrayaan and India’s achievements in space exploration. This activity inspired curiosity about science and technology while strengthening their sense of patriotism and respect for the nation’s progress.

From **8th to 14th August**, the school celebrated **Heritage Week**, a time dedicated to exploring India’s diverse and glorious traditions. Children expressed their imagination through the **Culture on the Wall Craft**, where they created artistic displays reflecting India’s festivals, monuments, dances, and traditional symbols. These displays turned into a colourful wall of culture that gave students pride in their heritage. A lively **Heritage Quiz** was held. Children actively took part, answering questions about India’s history, monuments, art forms, and traditions. It sharpened their knowledge while building confidence in expressing what they had learned. The much-awaited **Fancy Dress Competition on National Leaders and Freedom Fighters** filled the classrooms with excitement. Children dressed as Mahatma Gandhi, Subhash Chandra Bose, Rani Laxmi Bai, Bhagat Singh, and other leaders. As they spoke lines and performed small acts in their roles, they learned about the sacrifices made by these leaders and developed respect for their struggle for freedom.
